Artistic director's message

What an amazing start to our 2014/15 season!

Our 10th anniversary revival of **The Vagina Monologues** was our most successful <u>Readers Theatre</u> production ever. Thank you, Gabriola!

There were bravas all round for the eight women who delivered Eve Ensler's smart, sassy and bittersweet monologues. Like the women in the 2004 production, our acting experience ranged from some to none. Kudos to director Jean Wyenberg (the narrator in the original production) who coaxed such persuasive performances from all of us.

The women had their fun in September – and what a lot of fun we had! In October it was the turn of the male members of Gabriola Players to shine.



In March we gave audiences a chance to sit in the courtroom during *Inherit the Wind*. This month, thanks to director Anne Drozd's innovative staging, we got to be flies on the wall in a jury room. As Reginald Roses's *Twelve Angry Men* so clearly illustrates, jurors are also human beings whose emotions and prejudices can cloud the question of "reasonable" doubt.

Bravos this time to the twelve far-from-angry men who so convincingly brought these individuals to life.

As our cover photo suggests, rehearsals are well underway for this year's pantomime. We are excited to be performing the **world premiere** of **Will Shakespeare The Panto** by Robin Bailes. 
