

Artistic director's message

I don't know how many community theatre groups can boast four world premieres in one season, but I'm guessing the answer is not many.

In December we had the world premiere of <u>Will Shakespeare The Panto</u> by Robin Bailes. Coming up next month we will be staging the world premieres of three one-act plays – all written by Gabriolans.

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Eyes of a Blue Dog by Mark Smith is an adaptation of a short story written in 1950 by Gabriel Garcia Marquez. Why this story? According to Mark: "I found it in a collection of his stories in the mid-80s, and it has stayed with me as a favourite since then. I think I like it so much because it leaves so many questions swirling in my mind." (Permission to adapt the story was given "with my blessing" by translator Gregory Rabassa.)

Lemon Yellow Laces by Dennis Johnston is another adaption, this one of a short story by his wife Sharon McInnes. The story is about Henry, a retired businessman, who is uncomfortable about his girlfriend Clare's work with the homeless. When he meets Polly, whose "home" is a park bench, his well-ordered life begins to unravel.

According to Dennis, "When I first read this story a few years ago, I immediately thought: 'Wow, this would make a great play.' The Gabriola Players call for plays by Gabriolans finally got me writing it. Now I'm directing it and looking forward to sharing it with our audiences."

Set in the lunchroom of a publishing house, *That's Nice* is an original play by Anne M. Holmes – the fiction-writing name of our own Miranda Holmes. (Little did she suspect when penning her novel *Rum Do* that one day, like her female protagonist, she would end up writing a play.)

"A couple of summers ago, Donna Deacon and I tried unsuccessfully to find a play we liked and could appear in together," Miranda says. "Eventually I found myself saying: 'Or I could just write one.' Once the germ of an idea came to me, the play – and its oddball characters – almost wrote itself. I'm thrilled that *That's Nice* was selected to be one of the Gabriola Playwrights plays to be premiered at this spring's one-act play festival."

Performances will be staged at the Rollo Centre on Friday, May 22 at 7pm, Saturday, May 23 at 2pm and 7pm, and Sunday, May 24 at 2pm. Tickets will be available soon at North Road Sports or on-line at gabriolaplayers.ca. Please be advised that the plays include strong language and mature themes.

Don Whitton Memorial Bursary



Gabriola Players is currently accepting applications for the **Don Whitton Memorial Bursary**.

Don was a member of Gabriola Players from its inception. He was involved in numerous productions before he passed away in 2010, and was also the guiding spirit behind our improvisation workshops.

In his memory, Gabriola Players offers an annual bursary of \$500 to a Gabriolan who is registering or has registered to study some aspect of **Theatre Arts** at a British Columbia university, college or recognized training centre.

The focus of study can be acting, directing, stage management or any related technical skill, such as lighting, sound or set design. Applicants must be a minimum of ten years old. There is no upper age limit. The Bursary may or may not be awarded in any given year, depending on whether or not there are applicants who meet the qualifying criteria.

Applications must be received by 1 September 2015. If there is a successful candidate, his or her name will be announced at the Gabriola Players AGM in late September and the bursary will be awarded by Sue Whitton.
