### Director's message

Our 2016/17 got off to a powerful start with four staged readings of *The Laramie Project*, directed by Jean Wyenberg. The cast of twelve put their hearts and souls into the production (as you can tell from some of their comments on the following page). And the audience knew it. There were a lot of tears shed both on and off the stage.

These are just two of the overwhelmingly positive comments we received from audience members:

"Beautifully and skillfully presented, wonderfully directed, deeply touching: thank you all."

"I very much enjoyed the play today...very moving. Such a powerful story. It was done so well. It truly brought me back to 1998 and all of the feelings I had watching via news this horrific act of violence. Bravo everyone involved. And thank you."

Following The Laramie Project, we had another well-received entry at the **Vancouver Island One-Act Play Festival**, with Christine McKim and Dean Clark giving their most heart-rending performance to date. (See BJ Godson's report on page 4 for more information.)

Next up, of course, we will be kicking off the holiday season with **The Return of Robin Hood** by Robin Bailes. This is – unbelievably! – going to be the **tenth** panto we have staged on Gabriola. It is also the third in a row written by Robin Bailes, who seems to have become the island's favourite pantomime author. (Director Miranda Holmes has received a lovely message from Mr. Bailes, which is shared – along with more information about this year's show, on page 5.)

The Return of Robin Hood will be performed at the Community Hall on Friday and Saturday November 25 and 26 at 7pm and on Saturday and Sunday November 26 and 27 at 2pm.

# The Laramie Project

For the director and cast **The Laramie Project** really was a labour of love.

As Jean Wyenberg said in her director's notes: "The idea of putting on a staged reading of the Laramie Project came to me just two days before the mass murder that took place in Orlando in June of this year. That event served to open our eyes to the fact that the kind of ignorance and blind hatred that resulted in the death of Matthew Shepard in 1998, is, tragically, still with us today. We have come a long way in a legal sense and in understanding and even in inclusivity, but we obviously still have a very long way to ao."

Many of the cast members were new to the stage and shared their reasons for taking the plunge.





**Jack Bones**: "I'm thrilled be part of a production which has great personal significance to me."

**Kit Pepper**: "Only a script of such magnitude could draw me here, onto the stage, for this, my very-first-time-ever performance."

**Corey Kuefler-ter Weeme**: "I'm a first-time actor with Gabriola Players. As a transgender youth, *The Laramie Project* story means a lot to me."

Older hands were equally passionate about the project.

**Ginny Lowes**: "I was compelled to participate in this Gabriola Players' production to add my voice to the chorus calling for tolerance and understanding."

**Donna Deacon**: "The Laramie Project is close to my heart because I still vividly remember the day my friend came to school with a black eye after being beaten up because he was gay. It may be 2016, but this story still needs to be told and I feel privileged to be part of bringing it to the stage."

**Peter Dzierzawa:** "I feel honoured to be part of this play. I've thought much about the life of Mathew Shephard since. I am often reminded of the line in the script, 'Good is coming out of evil'. It is my hope to be able to add a bit to the 'Good'."

**Roger Carter:** "I'm very happy and grateful to be part of this show – a show that feels as relevant and necessary now as when it was first written."

**Miranda Holmes** "It has been an absolute pleasure and privilege to work with a director and cast who feel as strongly as I do about this powerful play. Matt Shepard's life was brutally cut short, but his legacy of tolerance lives on."



### **Vancouver Island 2016 One Act Play Festival**



On the first weekend in November Gabriola Players entered *Heart In the Ground* by Douglas Hill in the annual one–act play festival in Qualicum Beach. We first saw this heart-wrenching drama performed at the Gabriola Players One Act Play Festival last May.

It was beautifully acted by Dean Clark and Christine McKim and thoughtfully directed by Dennis Johnston. The reaction of Gabriola audiences to the play (including more than one standing ovation) indicated that they were overwhelmingly touched. Encouraged by this success, the Board decided to enter the play in the festival, presented each year in Qualicum Beach.

In Qualicum, Christine and Dean offered what all the crew members agreed was their finest performance of the year. The audience seemed riveted and there have been many sincere congratulatory comments and emails for our team, including this, sent in by the writer/director of one of the Saturday night entries:

"Thank you for a beautifully constructed play with two top notch performances. Incredibly crafted and rich in depth and detail. The audience was held in your hands from start to finish. Kudos to the actors and director."

And this, from the general stage manager of the Festival:

"The audience was profoundly affected by your actors' performances. The subject matter was disturbing and was delivered in a most sobering manner. I hope very much that your group will keep bringing the 'Gabriola theatre talent' to the mid-island...we are richer for it."


This was our fourth time entering a play in the Vancouver Island One Act Play Festival, and it won't be the last!

It started in 2014, when I directed the world premiere of *Will Shakespeare The Panto* by Robin Bailes, continued last year with his *Robin Hood and His Merry Men*, and finishes this year with *The Return of Robin Hood*.

Although only a year has passed in *our* time since these characters were last with us, several years have gone by. Robin is retired, living in "domestic bliss" with his beautiful wife Marian. And the Merry Men are keeping themselves busy doing nothing.

But what's this? Innocent children being pursued by their evil uncle – and his even more evil mother? Sounds like a job for Robin Hood!

Gabriolans can expect more of the same from this third installment. Lots of singing, lots of dancing, lots of booing, lots of cheering and lots of audience participation. Yes, there will be more Abba, more Queen and, as always, a bit of Monty Python.

As always, I've had the joy of working with a wildly talented and wonderfully wacky cast, not to mention the amazing costume team and set designers. If you check the list for crew members in the programme, you'll see there are many more people beavering away backstage than there are onstage, each and every one of them playing an important role in ensuring the success of the show.

My thanks to all of them. They totally rock. Enjoy the show!

#### MARCH 2017 – ONE-ACT PLAY FESTIVAL




Although the programme for our popular festival of one-act plays has yet to be finalised, we are happy to announce that once again the show will include a new one-act play written by a Gabriolan.

They're the guys we love to hate: the used car salesmen.


