

Director's message

Another great season has come to an end, launched last September with Jill Daum's poignant and deeply personal play <u>Forget About Tomorrow</u>. In November we staged the world premiere of Lesley Hazeldine's delightful pantomime <u>Pirates of Nursery Rhyme Island</u>. Our <u>One-Act Play Festival</u> in March once again proved a hit with audiences, featuring Jackie Lines' farcical <u>Whisking Eggs</u> and performances of Norm Foster's <u>My Narrator</u> by our special guests, Galiano Players.

Foster's work was back on stage in May with our sold out run of his charming comedy *Old Love*. (See page 3 for more.)

Earlier this month the season ended with Love's Labour's Lost. We managed to get the Bard in the Garden at the Commons for a chilly opening night, before rain drove us indoors. Happily our audience followed us to the Rollo to enjoy this Shakespeare comedy. (See page 4.) Once again we'd like to offer a **huge** thank you to Garry Davey for his inspiring guidance, turning a ragtag band of actors into a Shakespearean troupe. We loved every minute of it – and so did the audience!

For us one of the major highlights of our 2018/19 season was the number of new actors who've joined the family. In January we held our first open auditions and the turnout was amazing. Half the actors in *Whisking Eggs* and *Old Love* were brand new to Gabriola audiences. And we'll be doing it again next January.

Old Love

In her programme notes, Donna Deacon, director of *Old Love* made a confession: she is in love with Canadian playwright Norm Foster. As Donna explains, Foster's plays are incredibly popular "because he cares about people, his dialogue is funny, warm, wise and deeply compassionate and his characters are true to their hearts."

This is certainly true of Old Love, in which divorced Bud (Tom Radcliffe) is having a hard time convincing recently-widowed Molly (Lesley Hazeldine) of this. Bud's been infatuated with Molly since the first time he met her decades earlier – when he was still married to Kitty (Margaret Litt) and she was married to his boss Arthur (Dave Innell). While Molly's son, Arthur Jr (Ray Appel) thinks she's entitled to some happiness, daughter-in-law Kendra (Janina Stajic) thinks "old love" is disgusting. Happily, as those who attended our sold out performances in May know, love triumphs.

Ray was one of three new (to Gabriola Players) actors who appeared in *Old Love*, along with Tom and Janina. They formed a fantastic ensemble with three more familiar faces – Lesley, Margaret and Dave. The play turned out to be Margaret's final performance with Gabriola Players. She and husband Walter have now moved off island and on to pastures new. Although we will miss her a lot, we wish them all the very, very best in the future.

Love's Labour's Lost

To paraphrase Robbie Burns and quote Shakespeare, the best laid schemes o' kings an' friends gang aft a-gley – especially when "this whimpled, whining, purblind, wayward boy, Dan Cupid" gets in the way.

In one of Shakespeare's earliest comedies, Ferdinand, King of Navarre, and his lords, Biron, Dumain and Longaville have vowed to devote three years to scholarly pursuits, forsaking earthly comforts and pleasures – particularly the company of women.

There's just one problem, as Biron, the least enthusiastic votary, delights in pointing out. (Rumour has it that Shakespeare wrote the role of the witty and rather verbose Biron for himself. Easy to believe.)






