

Gabriola Players at Cultivate

Gabriola Players kicked off its 2019/20 season at the Cultivate Festival with **Special Delivery**, a workshop designed to illustrate how many different interpretations there can be for the written word. One scene played three different ways.



Here's the scene: Two people (gender unspecified) at an airport. Person A is leaving. Person B doesn't really want Person A to go. They talk. The flight is called. The scene ends.

Who are these people? What's their back story? Answering these questions was the challenge for three directors and six actors. That and figuring out who "Ellie" was.

In the first version, directed by Donna Deacon, Janina Stajic and Ray Appel (top photo) were an on-again-off-again couple who were about to be off again permanently. If she can't get him to stay for her, perhaps he'll stay for Ellie, their cat. In the end he stays, although it's not for the cat.



In the second version, directed by Lesley Hazeldine, both characters were male. Dave Innell and Marshall Mangan (centre) were lifelong best friends, driven apart by the affair one has had with the other's wife Ellie. Exactly the same words, but a completely different situation.

In the third version, directed by Jean Wyenberg, Susan Yates and Jeff Malmgren (bottom) are brother and sister. She's come to stay to help him and his daughter Ellie out after his wife abandons them. Now she needs to get back to her own family. He doesn't want her to go, but she does. Exactly the same words.



After the three versions were performed, audience members were asked to suggest a fourth scenario. Someone asked for Person A and Person B to be bank robbers and voila Dave was making his getaway at the airport. Exactly the same words.

We've had very complimentary feedback on the workshop, both from the festival organisers and from audience members, one of whom wrote to tell us:

"We found the presentation by Gabriola Players at the Cultivate Festival informative and entertaining. One scene done three ways with three sets of actors and directors gave us real insight into how the words on the page can be interpreted. It was the highlight of the Cultivate Festival for us. Please do more of this!"

Our thanks to everyone who came out to the workshop. We think it's safe to say we'll be back at Cultivate next year.

Don Whitton Memorial Bursary

Before our presentation began at Cultivate, there was a very special task to perform: the awarding of the 2019 **Don Whitton Memorial Bursary** to our lovely **Luisa Handford**. Lu, who has appeared many times in Gabriola Players productions, has now begun the Acting for Stage and Screen Program at Capilano University. We're so happy to help her out with the costs of her studies.

The Bursary was created in 2010 to assist Gabriolans pursuing education or training in some aspect of theatre arts. It is funded through the sale of refreshments at our performances and through donations, including generous gifts from the Whitton family.

As there was no applicant last year, we decided to offer two bursaries this year of \$1000 each. When Lu's was the only successful application, we opted to increase the award to \$1500 (if Lu looks as if she's about to burst into tears in the photo it might be because she received \$500 more than expected) and offer another \$1500 bursary in 2020.

Improv workshop



Gabriola Players is thrilled to be offering members an introduction to the wonderful world of improvisation in an afternoon workshop led by Tom Radcliffe.

Improv is a theatrical form where the actors make up their lines and actions as they go along based on the characters they are playing, whilst co-operating with each other to tell a (hopefully interesting, moving, or funny) story.

This workshop will introduce theatrical improv and lead the participants through a series of exercises to show how characters


with problems can be turned into interesting stories that audiences can follow and enjoy, all on the spur of the moment and without the benefit of a script, director, rehearsal, or the rest of the boring bits of scripted theatre. Skills introduced will include making mistakes, listening, spontaneity, building and staying in character, and creating simple stories.

The workshop will be held at the Rollo Centre on Sunday, December 8 from 1pm to 4pm. Spaces are limited and will be assigned on a first come, first serve basis. If you are interested, please send an email to gabriolaplayers@gmail.com with the subject "Improv".

Tom Radcliffe is an actor and improvisor who has trained at the Improv Comedy Institute (associated with Vancouver Theatre Sports) and other improv schools in Vancouver, including Blind Tiger, Instant Theatre, Second Storey Theatre, and independent instructors such as Jennifer Peilak's improvised musical theatre programme. He has performed at various venues in Vancouver as part of 180 Improv, the Treble Makers, and others. His primary interest as an improvisor is long-form story-telling. Tom will be assisted by Hilary Farmer, who has studied improv in Montreal and Vancouver.


