In response to rapidly growing concerns about the need to observe "social distancing" and with a very heavy heart, we decided to cancel the final two performances.

We would like to thank everyone who came out and enjoyed the first two sold-out shows. We are also **extremely** grateful to the many, many people with tickets for Saturday and Sunday who have so kindly offered the cost of their tickets as donations to help us keep afloat in these troubling times.

It will come as no surprise to learn that we have also taken the decision to cancel plans for our performance of Will Eno's *The Realistic Joneses* in May. This is au revoir, rather than goodbye. The play will be mounted instead in May 2021.

These are tough, worrying and uncertain times for our community and for the wider world. The responsible measures we are all taking to isolate ourselves and protect the vulnerable will inevitably have far reaching consequences for local businesses, including those whose support of Gabriola Players and other arts events on the island make what we do possible. Let's all support those businesses as much as we can in the coming weeks and months.

Scott Rivers (right) made his debut with Gabriola Players this month, appearing with Joe DiCara in Life on Mars, written by Canadian playwright Elliott Hayes and directed by Donna Deacon. The two played short order cooks who relax with a beer and contemplate the universe while watching the lunar eclipse at the back of the diner after their shift. Frank and Mike ponder some of life's big questions. Such as: "Where would you go if you left here?" Or: "Are we alone...or are there other beings way out there?" 
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Still to come in 2020?
