In early September we were delighted to once again award the Don Whitton Memorial Bursary to **Luisa Handford**, who is entering her third year in the Acting for Stage and Screen program at Capilano University. The last live theatre seen on Gabriola was in March 2020 when Joe DiCara and Scott Rivers performed *Life* on Mars by Canadian playwright Elliott Hayes as part of our annual One-Act Play Festival. Our board members Tom Radcliffe and Ray Appel also wowed Cultivate audiences with their performances as the artist Mark Rothko and his assistant Ken in John Logan's Tony award-winning play *Red*, directed by Frank Moher for Over the Moon Theatricals.

## Don Whitton Memorial Bursary

The 2021 Don Whitton Memorial Bursary was once again awarded to Luisa Handford to help her pursue her dream of a career in the theatre. In this letter she shared her voyage of discovery with us.

Dear Gabriola Players,

Thank you so much for awarding me the Don Whitton Memorial Bursary, which will be a great help as I return to Capilano University for my third year in the Acting for Stage and Screen program.

The past two years have been an unforgettable experience for me, I feel words could never explain how much the program has taught me. Every day I feel very grateful to have the chance to study such a beautiful art form in this depth.

In just the past year, I've acted in many student films, stage productions, music videos and built my first demo reel. I've written commercials, short films, stage plays, zoom plays, monologues and stand-up comedy. Most recently, I've taken up an interest in directing. During my most recent term at Capilano, I directed three stage plays: The Provoked Husband (a 2021 version of The Provoked Wife by John VanBrugh), Timely Matters by Stephanie Cardona, and Hidden Reflections, a play I wrote, inspired by and including works by Canadian poet Shane Koyczan, an artist I have long admired.

Hidden Reflections was one of two plays which were performed and filmed in the Blueshore Theatre at Capilano. Seeing my work performed on this stage is a memory and thrill I will never forget. I never expected I'd ever see a story I wrote come to life. I always figured I was an actor and only an actor, but the empowering experience of my work being performed has helped me build the confidence to expand my skill set beyond acting. The program at Capilano has exposed me to so many levels of performing arts media in which I never thought I could ever succeed. I've learnt that success comes in many forms, and one of its finest forms is failure. I have learnt more, developed stronger, and succeeded further, from failing first.

My reasons for continuing to pursue this course are many. I know I belong in this profession, there is no career path I would rather follow. I love the learning experience and environment in which I am surrounded. I still have so much to learn and the education I have been receiving at Capilano is beyond anything I ever imagined. I will forever have this experience of learning as I pursue my dreams of a career in the performing arts.

## Workshops



In early September Gabriola Players offered its first play writing workshop, led by playwright/director Frank Moher.

There were ten participants – including a surprise guest appearance by actress Nicola Cavendish, a long time supporter of Gabriola Players, who wanted to get past coming up with great names for plays she never wrote. Frank took us through our paces on character and plot development and introduced us to the "Five Ws & a D" of play writing: Who is the play about? What do they want? What do they do to get it? Who/What gets in their way? Do they get what they want or not?

Our overnight assignment was to write a scene featuring Violet, a protagonist created in class earlier in the day, and our own antagonist. One of the highlights of the workshop was hearing these scenes and finding out who everyone else had chosen as a protagonist. So much so that a number of the participants, all of whom have some sort of work in progress, decided to carry on with regular fortnightly meetings of what we've dubbed the "First Draft Club". We'll get together, read and listen to one another's work, provide encouragement and help, where we can, with stumbling blocks.

The meetings will continue to the end of the year, by which time we're all hoping we'll have a one-act play ready to submit for consideration for production at next spring's one-act play festival.
